  The purpose of this study is to record personal testimonies related to Hurricane Sandy. The primary research question seeks to contextualize extreme weather within the daily lives of New Jersey residents. This type of research recognizes that disaster is a complex process as risk and vulnerability are concentrated at specific geographic locations and amongst particular populations. The collection of contextualizing knowledge sheds light on a wide range of issues, including infrastructural development, public assessment of short-term and long-term risk, and the subjective cost of disaster.
- 2. Brief Rationale for the Study (Why is this study needed? How does it fit in with existing research? What new knowledge will this study potentially add? Approximately 150 words.):

  The collection of personal narratives relating to loss and trauma following natural disasters represents a Key venue for engaged social science research. This includes the collection of longitudinal data framing Hurricane Sandy (the event) within larger social and cultural practices. Numerous agencies (e.g., International Social Science Council, UN International Strategy for Disaster Reduction) are increasingly seeking this type of information to address a number of important goals. Contextualizing testimonies helps create wider exposure of the long-term causes of risk, supports an integrated approach to disaster research, and acknowledges that risk and experience are locally-dependent. Additionally, personal narratives are emotionally compelling and can help effectively communicate the longitudinal nature of disaster as process.
